About Wickenburg, Arizona

Wickenburg lies in the foothills of the Bradshaw Mountains, along the banks of the Hassayampa River one hour from Downtown Phoenix.

Henry Wickenburg came to the area in search of gold. He was rewarded with the discovery of Vulture Mine (1863-1942), where over 340,000 ounces of gold and 260,000 ounces of silver were found. There are still relics around the area that stand as a tribute to these early adventurers, as well as a walking tour around Vulture City, which is adjacent to the present-day Vulture Mine.

Ranchers and farmers discovered the fertile flood plain of the Hassayampa River. The Hassayampa River Preserve lets you escape to a literal oasis with lush, streamside habitat that include many endangered birds and animals. Together, with Henry Wickenburg and the miners, they helped found the young community of Wickenburg in 1863. The Town of Wickenburg was incorporated in 1909.

Message from the Chief

As the Chief of Police, it is my pleasure to present the Wickenburg Police Department's 2023 Annual Report.

Throughout the past year, the members of the Wickenburg Police Department have worked tirelessly to identify and resolve the crime issues impacting our community, while adhering to our three principles of excellence: pride, valor, and service. I am extremely proud of the professionalism and dedication shown by the members of our department. They work, 24/7, risking their lives every day and night to serve and protect our community and visitors alike.

Over the past year, the Wickenburg Police Department has seen an increase in its sworn staffing, including the hiring of 6 new police officers to help fill vacancies in patrol. Along with the hiring of new officers came a generous 2-million-dollar award from the State, that was used to purchase new equipment, vehicles and software. The availability of these funds has gone a long way in assisting the department in its recruiting efforts and mission to better serve our community. The department collaborated with the school district and was awarded a grant to add an additional two school resource officer positions, located at Vulture Peak Middle School and Hassayampa Elementary.

Contained in this document are additional crime statistics, as well as accomplishments which are directly attributed to the hard work of our officers and their community policing efforts. In 2023, Wickenburg experienced a 16% reduction in violent crime, and a 19.7% reduction in property crime while traffic crashes increased by 17.3%. The Wickenburg Police Department response time to priority one calls decreased by 14% from 2022 to 2023 as well.

The Wickenburg Police Department pledges to remain steadfast in its efforts to address crime and the trepidation of crime to keep Wickenburg one of the safest communities in Arizona. On behalf of the men and women of the Wickenburg Police Department, we want to thank you for the wonderful support shown by the staff, citizens, and elected officials of our community.

The Department's **CORE** Values



We will be active in being professional at all times and build relationships with our citizens through quality service and community engagement opportunities (Coffee with a Cop, Explorers, Cops Who Care, etc.).

Community Engagement



Citizen's Patrol

The Wickenburg Citizen's Patrol is a volunteer branch of the Wickenburg Police Department consisting of 15 community members. In 2022, the Citizen's Patrol provided over 1925 volunteer hours. Members conduct vacation watch on homes, assist with traffic during high volume events, work on special projects, conduct fingerprinting, assist on patrol, and attend meetings and trainings. In addition, Citizen's Patrol members install and maintain the Medical Alert Program (MAP). The MAP allows people with medical problems to live alone with the benefit of a notification device that can contact the Wickenburg Police Dispatch if a medical necessity arises. The Citizen's Patrol is an invaluable asset to the Wickenburg Police Department and the community. School Resource Officer (SRO)

The Wickenburg Police Department has been staffed with a full-time School Resource Officer (SRO) since August of 2017. The position is funded through a federal grant awarded to the Wickenburg Unified School District, which was awarded for an additional three years in 2020, with the focus being at the Wickenburg High School though the officer is designed support all three-district schools located within the Wickenburg community when needed. The current SRO is Officer Joe Lahey, a 16-year veteran of the department, and he spends his days ensuring campus safety, awareness classes and more. In 2021, Officer Lahey was awarded the Law Related Education Officer of the Year by the Arizona Bar Foundation.



Cops Who Care

In 1982, a collection was taken by local Wickenburg officers that allowed the purchase of Christmas presents for 250 needy children. Following this event, in 1983 a charity was formally founded as Cops Who Care (CWC), a non-profit organization that was comprised of local and surrounding law enforcement officers of multiple agencies. Though Cops Who Care is commonly identified by members of the community as a police department program, it is actually a non-profit organization managed through the volunteer work of Department personnel and community members.

In 2023, Cops Who Care received \$38,325.64 in donations. With those donations, in partnership with the Wickenburg Community Action Program, over 201 families were provided Christmas gifts and other supplies. In total, 536 children from Wickenburg & surrounding communities were given approximately 1072 gifts.

Other events held included the 41st Annual Car Show & Toy Drive and the annual Easter Egg Hunt held at Coffinger Park. Cops Who Care was also able to provide multiple sponsorships including:



The Wickenburg Police Department first began holding these events on November 22, 2016 and continues today with an event being held approximately every quarter with the venue rotated through the variety of local businesses.




Explorers

*More than one report can be received per incident





Special Response Team (SRT)

What we do...

- Made up of members of the Wickenburg Police Department and Fire Department
- Trains for and responds to critical incidents or other high-risk situations such as active shooter response, emergency hostage rescue, barricaded suspects, search warrant service, surveillance, and tracking operations
- Conducts monthly trainings to prepare for their assignment




To be a part of the team, candidates must pass a rigorous physical fitness test, and maintain this level of fitness for annual testing. After the fitness tests, potential members participate in a one-day screening that evaluates the candidate's physical fitness, mental toughness, decision making, and firearms skills. Upon successful completion of the screening, members attend a basic 40 SWAT operator school, and then further advanced trainings.

Public Safety Dispatcher

The Communications personnel for the Wickenburg Police Department, and the Wickenburg Fire Department, are the first line of defense between the public and the emergency services they may need.

The Communications Center is staffed 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.



ESSENTIAL DUTIES The following are intended to describe core work functions of this classification. While the level and broad nature of essential duties may not change, specific work tasks will vary over time depending on the Town's needs.

- Receives, evaluates, and prioritizes requests for emergency and non-emergency services from the public, Town employees, and other police agencies; communicates with callers to obtain accurate and essential information; routes calls to Officers through the use of a Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) system.
- Ensures the proper location of officers and other public safety personnel; ensures the safety of officers in the field, responding to calls; maintains proper status of calls and officers; ensures officers and other public safety personnel has appropriate resources for response.
- Provides emotional support to callers.
- Conducts research, enters, updates and retrieves information from computerized databases.
- Monitors and relays information to other agencies through the use of Town traffic cameras, various 911 assistance tools, multi-agency report databases, etc.

- Received our LPR cameras; to date we've installed 2 cameras.

- Started a West Valley Speed and Aggressive driving task force.
